From Bella Coola, with love

Originally slated to premiere at this year's Victoria Film Festival, the latest documentary by local filmmaker Barbara Hager (Motown High), From Bella Coola To Berlin, will be making an appearance at this week's Movie Monday. This brief-but-fascinating doc tells the story of nine Bella Coola men who, in 1885, travelled to Berlin to perform their traditional songs and dances around the country for 13 months.



Little is known about these nine Nuxalk men: only three of the nine mens' English names are remembered (and it's surprising that they were even allowed to leave, as, at that time, the songs and dances they were going to perform were outlawed in Canada). but there is little doubt that this experience had a lasting impact on the community.

Through interviews with Nuxalk elders and German scholars and historical documents such as German show programs and academic writings (while the show was greeted with much fascination by the anthropologists of the day, it was a commercial failure because it didn't fit with that time's perception of the Wild West-style native American), Hager has shed light on this intriguing happening that changed the remote B.C. community forever.

Hager will be at the screening, which happens at 6:30 p.m. Monday, March 9 at the Eric Martin Pavillion.
